

WIM Indigenous Student

Women in Mining (WIM) Canada wishes to recognize those Indigenous women students who have played a pivotal role in their studies /with other students/ at their school/highlighting the role of Indigenous youth and women in the industry. The Indigenous Student Trailblazer Award consists of a CAN\$500 prize, as well as the opportunity to represent both students and Indigenous Women in Mining Canada at various events throughout the year. The winner will also chair next year's selection committee for the Award.

The winner of the Award will be expected to attend the Women in Mining Canada event at the Prospectors and Developer's Association of Canada (PDAC) annual convention in March 2018.

Eligibility

Indigenous (First Nation, Inuit and Métis) Female students currently enrolled in post-secondary (grade 12) studies, including a Canadian university, technical college, or trade school program and have shown an interest in working in the mining industry, once their courses have been completed. Working experience in the industry is an asset; however, it is not a requirement. All fields of study will be considered.

Applicants must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents. Bilingualism is an asset but not required.

Nomination Guidelines

- 1. Please fill out the application form below.
- 2. Provide a one-page CV, and highlight your interest in the mining industry and any applicable experience, work or otherwise (i.e. volunteering, mentoring, etc.)
- 3. Provide a full transcript for your school. An unofficial transcript is accepted.
- 4. Provide letters of support or reference from at least two (2) of the following:
 - a. Professors/teachers/tutors
 - b. Peers/colleagues
 - c. Community leaders or Elders
 - d. Work supervisors or employers
 - e. Leaders of volunteer organizations

We also strongly encourage you to nominate your mentor for the Rick Hutson Memorial Award.

The closing date for receipt of nominations January 31st, 2018.
